Blue Magruder	H.2167 would provide Barnstable County with a necessary level of preparedness against the possibility of a radiological accident at the Pilgrim Nuclear Power Station. It does so by directing the Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency (MEMA) to perform an assessment of the need for additional state actions to ensure public safety beyond what is already required by radiological emergency preparedness plans provided for under existing law. Based on that assessment, MEMA would be further directed through H.2167 to make recommendations, including legislation, to address the findings of its assessment.

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In 2014, APCC conducted an analysis of the potential threats from the Pilgrim plant to the Cape's environment and natural systems. The conclusions reached from APCC's environmental analysis were consistent with previous conclusions expressed by other organizations and officials regarding the serious human health and safety threats to Cape Cod resulting from an accident at Pilgrim.

Until Pilgrim is shut down and the decommissioning process is complete, the people and natural environment of Cape Cod will be exposed to the potential threats of an accident at the nuclear plant. H.2167 creates a process for making sure that state and local governments and emergency planning authorities are adequately prepared for any contingency.

APCC thanks the Joint Committee on Public Safety and Homeland Security for its careful consideration of H.2167. We hope the committee will support this important legislation.
